Old Business

Bylaw Review: The committee met again and decided not to change the mission statement but to leave it as it is for now and change it sometime in the future. Amy Hankins suggests making this a goal of the Site Council.

In a hand-out, old bylaws are typed in blue and the newest recommendation from committee is typed in black. Highlights in yellow are off-the-record comments.

1. Consensus Making Process – Do we want to have a clear definition in the bylaws? Regarding Section III of the bylaws (Decision Making), Site Council received recommendations from the PTA regarding the last statement of first paragraph. The statement reads as follows: "All SSSBC members agree to support the final decision." This also brought to question the last sentence

of the second paragraph, which reads, "Once consensus or a vote has been reached, members are responsible for supporting and explaining the decision."

- a. *Comments from Trevan Walker:* Folks that contribute to that process need to defend that process. We don't want to disrupt the integrity of the body to which we all belong.
- b. *General comments:* Strike last sentence of first paragraph but keep last sentence of 2nd paragraph. Also, add the word 'process' to the end of the last sentence of 2nd paragraph.
- c. Clarifying the middle statement of the second paragraph: "members should represent their constituencies." Do we want to be more specific, or does this limit the scope of the representation? We decided to leave statement as it is.
- d. *Comments from Trevan Walker:* Courageous leadership is what is needed. Members make the best decisions as leaders and should be trusted.
- 2. Section IV SSSBC Membership Should the composition be changed (more members added)? The Principals said no, as did several other council members.
 - a. *Selection Process Discussion:* Move elections to May as opposed to having them during conferences in October.
 - b. *Terms:* Amy Hankins asks about staggering the terms of the three parent representatives so that one parent per year expires. A long discussion followed pointing out the pros and cons of this idea. The discussion ended with most not in favor.
 - c. Removal and Replacement: Strike the last part of the last sentence of the second paragraph ("subject to the approval of the membership"). The Council Secretary will add to the top of the minutes an excused absence list.
- 3. Section V Officers Is the list of job descriptions necessary, and if so, do we need to refine the duties descriptions?
 - a. Comments on job descriptions: We need to agree on the job descriptions.
 - b. Comments on agenda setting: Whose job is it? Trevan Walker suggests that the principals set the agenda. In the past, the agenda could have been streamlined if certain items were addressed by the principals alone. The principals are the first filter or the gatekeepers of information. Principals may decide to keep an issue internal, but will bring items to the Site Council as needed. Jason Bickling states that efficiency during Council meetings is important. Others mention that meetings tend to get off agenda. Mica Van Buskirk does not agree that principals should set the agenda. Von Terry states

that this requires more discussion, and added that hot topics definitely need to come to Council as people don't always feel comfortable going directly to a principal. He states that if principals set the agenda, it "shifts the mindset of those who have the power." The topic ended with Mica agreeing to send the agenda to the principals for streamlining prior to meetings.

4. Finally, site council needs to make a decision about whether or not the principals can vote.

New Business

Middle School Reconfiguration Planning Meeting Report: Jason Bickling held a meeting at 5:30 p.m. (in the Middle School PD Room) to discuss the reconfiguration. Multiple hand-outs were available at the Site Council meeting. Please contact Jason with any questions.

Celebration Recognition at SHS: To be part of the renowned SHS Wall of Fame, SHS students or teams (current) had to have won a state championship and shown athletic prowess. Some wish to broaden the criteria for getting on the Wall of Fame, noting that there isn't any way to recognize academic or political achievements. Some wondered if this demonstrated that SHS only values athleticism. Case in point: Someone was nominated for the Wall of Fame but had not won a state championship.

Nevertheless, his accomplishment was highly worthy. The issue was way bigger "than I could answer," said Trevan Walker, so he brought it to a staff meeting. A brilliant recommendation came out of that meeting, but it breaks from tradition, which is why it has been brought to the Site Council. The idea is to change it from Wall of Fame to Wall of Champions, allowing us to recognize those with achievements that are not athletic in nature. We created a committee to set criteria for the new wall (application process, choosing inductees, etc.). The first meeting is next Tuesday.
